Property/Maintenance


Our first year has been a very busy and productive one. The leach field and pumping station projects are almost completed. The major construction work is done and the

Drought **Conditions**

The Drought Task Force convened Thursday, August 4' for the first time since 2002 in response to the dry weather that has led to below average ground and surface water levels across Maine.


Groundwater levels vary significantly statewide and groundwater levels in the southern portion of Maine trend much below normal to low. Unlike stream flow data, there is not a long accurate history of groundwater levels.

Reservoir storages in the headwaters are below their long term averages. Sebago Lake, the largest water supplier in Maine, currently has water levels 6 inches below the long term average for Auaust 1st.

Currently portions of 15 counties in Maine are abnormally dry and portions of 10 counties are experiencing moderate drought, according to the U.S. Drought Mitigation Center. Conditions are expected to persist in the southern coastal region of Maine through October.

We need to make sure that we are doing our part by avoiding unnecessary water consumption. Some of the things they are suggesting we do are, turn water off while brushing your teeth, and make sure you are doing full loads of laundry and dishes. Use water sparingly when watering your lawn or garden.



Town Hall COP Talk

On Thursday afternoon the Freeport Police Department hosted a public forum to establish an ongoing line of communication with the residents of the town. The audience was a small group made up of some concerned citizens, including five of us from Wardtown, and a couple of journalists from local papers.

We were welcomed by Chief Nourse and she told us that she wanted to have these get-togethers to reach out to the community and hear their comments and concerns. She went on to give us a little information on the changes that have happened in the department. She was promoted to Chief in June. She has been on the force in Freeport for over thirty years. With her promotion, there was an opening for a Lieutenant. In July, Nate Goodman was promoted to that rank. He has been with the force for 20 years. Both of them have been around long enough to know the area and some of the



people fairly well. They are now searching candidates for the rank of Sergeant and hope to have someone by the end of the month. They have also added two new officers. One of them has come to us from the Topsham police department. The other one has served in

the military and will have to go to the academy before becoming actively involved in the town.

Chief Nourse then opened things up to questions, concerns and comments. One woman said that she was glad that the department was open to dialog with the community. Deanna brought up the issues we are having with speeding vehicles in our park and asked what our role should be in solving the




problem. Chief Nourse said that we are doing what we are supposed to do - report the problems as they arise, take plate numbers when possible, and be sure that our residents and their guests are aware of our speed limit and our safety issues. With our presence at this meeting, the Department knows how concerned we are about our safety here and are aware of the significant number of complaints we hear about speeding vehicles. Others in the audience also spoke of speeding in their neighborhoods and Lieutenant Goodman said that that is one of the biggest problems in Freeport. They are trying several different ways to slow people down. Visuals are definitely a good reminder and they are using things like decoy cars, digital speed signs and the signs in the crosswalks on Main Street to do that.

I, for one, am glad that forums like these are going to continue. I think it is a good way to keep communication open and dialogs going so we can find ways to work together to keep Freeport safe.

Feeder Facts

Those of us in the park that keep birdfeeders and many who just watch the local birds, find some of the most beautiful examples of nature right in our back yards. We all love the striking red Cardinals that visit our neighborhood, but nothing can turn a head like the flicker of yellow that comes from the amazing color of the male Goldfinch. Because of this trait, they are nicknamed "Lightning Birds". There are hundreds of them right here in this community and I enjoy feeding them and watching their antics every day.

The American Goldfinch is the only finch in its subfamily to go through a complete molt. This means that the bird loses all of its lovely yellow feathers and grows new ones. The male is a vibrant yellow in the summer and an olive-brown in the winter. The female is much duller yellow-brown in the winter and brightens only a bit in the summer. The males are brighter in the



summer to attract a mate. Once they have a mate they are usually together for life.

The female builds the nest in late summer. The male goes with her to gather

materials for the nest but leaves the building to her. The nest is constructed high in a tree and consists of bark bound by spider webs and caterpillar silk. The inside is lined with plant down from milkweed, thistle or cattail. The nest is so tightly woven that it can hold water and if the parents do not cover it, the nestlings could drown following a rainstorm.

The American goldfinch is the state bird of Iowa and New Jersey where it is referred to as the "Eastern Goldfinch" and Washington, where it is referred to as the "Willow Goldfinch". It was chosen as the state bird of Washington in 1951 by the schoolchildren of that state.

Did You Know?

Like all towns across this great country, the Town of Freeport always makes a big deal around the Fourth of July with fireworks and huge celebrations. But did you know that we are not just celebrating the independence of the United States on that day? Did you know that the Fourth of July is also Independence Day for the Town of Freeport?

On July 4th, 1789, the Town of Freeport, Maine declared its independence from North Yarmouth. According to the Freeport Historical Society, that first celebration was complete with a parade which followed the same route down Main Street as current parades do, focusing on the section of Main Street where Bow Street enters which was, and is still, known as Freeport Corner or Freeport Square.

Energy Audit Applications

At least 4 homes had an energy audit done this year in the park, either through Efficiency Maine or Opportunity Alliance. Recommendations were made for insulation of the belly pan, attic and some of the vents. Those that went through Efficiency Maine were covered for the \$50 co-pay through a CBD Grant that the town of Freeport received. This grant doesn't cover homes older than 1976 which were covered by Opportunity Alliance. Those that went through Opportunity Alliance may be required to pay the \$50 co-pay, but Efficiency Maine contractors will still do the work. They have no age limits on the homes as told to me by Dana Fischer, the Residential Home Manager at Efficiency Maine. Those that haven't heard any thing about the work being done are encouraged to call Johanna Hanselman at 865-4743 Ext 120 to inquire about a possible date to do the work.

New Leadership from CDI

As part of our ten-year commitment to Maine State Housing, we are provided a Technical Advisor through the Cooperative Development Institute. Until just a week ago, our advisor was Dawn Willette, a talented woman who lives in our sister park in Brunswick. Dawn has moved on to a position with Genesis, another organization with whom we have a funding agreement. Our new TA is Jeanee Wright. Jeanee joins CDI after being with ROC NH for many years. She has over 20 years of training experience and ten years of cooperative development experience. She spent 7 years serving on the Board of Directors in her own cooperative in New Hampshire, where she led a committee to plan and execute a project to replace failing water, sewer and electrical systems. Both Jeanee and Dawn will be at our Barbecue on August 14th. Please stop by and meet Jeanee and her family, and wish Dawn well in her new position.

building leveled and skirted. The second phase was to pull up all of the cracked, broken flooring tiles and replace them with nice, new flooring. Home Again

When I was a kid, before girls and credit cards, I ate Cheerios and milk for breakfast and lived in a neighborhood in Woodfords in Portland. I call it a neighborhood, because it was - in the true sense of the word. I knew everyone, in every house, all the way up and down the street, and my parents knew them too. Folks there were friends. They waved at each other, they liked each other and they helped each other - at every opportunity. If my dad was up on the roof swinging a hammer, there were three or four neighbors right up there with him. If his neighbor was working on his car, my dad came home covered in oil and grease. In the winter of 1988-89 my parents home experienced a significant fire. In the months that it took to rebuild that home. they never once stayed in a hotel, and I am quite sure they rarely cooked a meal.

I once thought neighborhoods like that were a thing of the past. Since marriage, kids and payments came into my life I have lived in a dozen or more places. I'm not sure I could tell you the names of more than three of my next-door neighbors and none of those that lived two or more doors down. Until today.

Maybe it's my age. I'm sixty now and perhaps I'm finally growing up, but I rather doubt that... Anyway. when I heard that Wardtown, my park, was going to explore becoming resident-owned, I went to the meeting, perhaps because I, in some way, felt threatened. I listened to the presentation and when they asked for volunteers to work on this exploration project, I went to the front of the room. Not sure why, I don't often do that. It was one of the best moves of my life. I got involved in my community.

Through that conversion to resident ownership, Wardtown, for me, has become more than a place to sleep. I am happier than I have been in my entire adult life. I am working on the office renovation project with my neighbors. I was able to help one of those neighbor save a boatload of money by setting up a free tv antenna at his house. I helped another get her refrigerator working. I spent my birthday at a campfire at another neighbor's house and had banana bread with a candle in it... And it has only just begun... I am involved. I see good friends every day. People wave, people like each other, and people help each other.

Wardtown is becoming a neighborhood in the true sense of the word. Today, I still eat Cheerios and milk for breakfast and I am finally home.
